Our new title, Cross Purposes: an introduction to mediaeval Manx crosses is now available. But it almost wasn't! The British Isles has been suffering from rather a lot of storms of late and our book consignment got up close and personal with three of them. At one stage our pallet of books spent something like a fortnight in a dockside English warehouse, waiting for the sea to calm down a bit, so that boats could make the crossing to the Isle of Man. When the ferry service did resume, goods such as medical supplies and food of course took priority. While all that was sorted out, we - and our customers - had to wait. And wait. And wait some more!

The book ended up being delivered about four weeks after it was expected, but it was worth all the worry. We are obviously biased but think this short introduction to the history and meaning of the ancient stones looks very well.
